

White Hills Park schools supporting the Broxtowe Mayor's Christmas Appeal

In the midst of all of the difficulties the last year has thrown at us all, there have been some positive things to emerge, not least the way that people have come together to support those in the greatest need. In schools we have seen the strength of our local communities who have rallied round and provided support, friendship and practical assistance. It has been particularly heartwarming to see the role that young people have played in this – many of our pupils have been at the forefront of the work in their communities. They have shown concern for those around them and have wanted to do whatever they can to help.

As schools, we have worked closely with other groups in the community. Local authorities, charities, voluntary organisations, local businesses and church groups have all joined forces to provide help where it is needed. I've written before about the partnership between our schools and Hope Nottingham, a wonderful local charity who run foodbanks and make deliveries of essential items to local families.

We know that the last few months have been particularly difficult for some – people have lost jobs and face uncertain futures, some have even lost loved ones to the pandemic. As we enter the holiday period, we are very pleased to be taking part in a project that will help keep the Christmas period special for families who have had to cope with an incredibly difficult year. The Mayor of Broxtowe, Cllr Janet Patrick, has launched an appeal in partnership with local foodbanks and schools to make sure that no one will go hungry in Broxtowe this Christmas.

The goal is to provide those in the greatest need with a Mayor's Christmas Hamper and shopping vouchers that can be used in local retailers. If you are able to support the appeal, you can either make a cash donation or give any of the following items to help the appeal by 4th December:




We've launched a brand new website to keep you up to date with everything going on in school, containing lots of useful information including:
