And we've done it all while holding fast to the belief that education isn't just about exams or data - it's about helping young people grow into confident, kind and capable adults who know their value and see their potential.

It has been one of the great privileges of my life to help lead this work. I'll miss it deeply, but I leave knowing the Trust is in excellent hands, and excited for the future ahead under Claire Shaw's leadership.

To everyone who has been part of this journey, thank you. I leave with a full heart - and a firm belief that, in our schools, the best is still to come.
